United Methodist Church Government

We are living through a rather tumultuous time within the denominational life of the United Methodist Church. Most of you who keep up with even the slightest bit of UMC news have undoubtedly heard rumors that our denomination may very well be headed for schism this May when the General Conference meets. Our denominational infighting has even been highlighted in the *Tennessean* newspaper and on national news like Reuters and CNN.

With all the news and publicity, with all the anxieties and uncertainties about the future, and with all the debate swirling around about how the denomination should teach and apply doctrine on topics of human sexuality, it is easy for one to get lost in the noise. When that happens...take a deep breath...pray to God...and remember, God is in "We are all faced with a series control no matter what the outcomes may be.

> Now, with all that said, I thought it might be helpful in this newsletter to simply outline how the government of our denomination functions and operates. Gaining knowledge of how our system works, has been for me, one of the best ways to ease feelings of anxiety and has aided me in how I pray for our denomination. I can direct those prayers toward the people and discerning bodies who most need our prayers at this critical moment in the life of our denomination.


> Yet before we begin, I want to state clearly that this article is not going to dive into the theological questions at hand regarding human sexuality. If you want to have that conversation with me, please feel free to email, call, or meet with me in person. I welcome those discussions. This article is simply about how our denomination's government is structured.

> The UMC has a government that is in many ways modeled after the three-branch system of the United States Government. We have an executive branch which is made up of the college of bishops. Bishops are essentially the chief elders of an annual conferences (we will discuss what an annual conference is in a bit). The Bishops offer pastoral care and guidance to an annual conference, they appoint annually where clergy will serve within the conference, and they offer vision and instruction for the conference they serve as well. Bishops do not set doctrine, but they help teach and maintain it.

> We also have a judicial branch. I will not need to spend much time on this, because it is somewhat self-explanatory. We have a system of courts which rules on cases where malpractice or misconduct has taken place. They rule on issues where the book of discipline has been broken (we will also discuss the book of discipline in a bit). Let's look at an example of this. In our doctrine we only baptize an individual once. We are not allowed to re-baptize someone who has already been baptized. It does not matter what denomination they came from or who performed their baptism. We believe that God's grace works through any baptism a person has received. Therefore, if a pastor re-baptizes someone knowingly, because they reject that the previous baptism "took" (for lack of a better word), this pastor could be brought before one of our judicial courts. They may decide to suspend or revoke his/her ordination over this infraction, or hand down some other type of consequence for the malfeasance.









The third branch is the most important for us to consider, it has the most to do with the current situation we are in. The UMC is made up of various conferences, each one being on a spectrum of largest to smallest. The largest conference is the General Conference. Following as second largest is the Jurisdictional Conference. Then third is the Annual Conference. And finally, we have the Charge Conference. What are each of these?

Because I would like to focus on the General Conference, I will briefly describe these others. The Jurisdictional Conference is made up of many Annual Conferences within a particular region (we are in the South Eastern Jurisdictional Conference). Each Annual Conference sends delegates to meet at Jurisdictional Conference, and their main (yet not their only) task is to elect and consecrate bishops. The Jurisdictional Conference meets every four years. The Annual Conference is made up of all the local churches within a specific and smaller geographical region, and it meets every year (hence the name annual). We are in the "Tennessee Conference," soon to be the "Western Kentucky-Tennessee Conference" as we have agreed to merge with the Memphis Conference. The Annual Conference is composed of clergy and lay delegates from all the churches in their geographical boundaries. They set the Conference budget, they ordain candidates to become elders and deacons, they vote on resolutions, remember clergy and clergy spouses who went to glory that year, and recognize retiring pastors, etc... The Charge Conference is the local church. Pegram UMC is an example of a Charge Conference.


Which brings us to the big topic. The General Conference. This is our highest legislative body. This is the most authoritative voice in the UMC apart from God and the Scriptures (we pray of course the General Conference voice be in harmony with God). It is made up of clergy and lay delegates from the Annual Conferences all around the globe. While bishops preside over the Conference, they do not participate in voting.

The General Conference meets every four years and they vote to uphold, amend, add to or subtract from our book of discipline. This is our book of doctrinal standards, it contains our Methodist constitution, it speaks to how church bodies are to be set up, what committees are mandatory in the local church, it speaks to social principles, parsonage standards, and so much more...everything necessary to know about how the UMC functions and what it teaches is in this book of discipline. This May (from the 5th to 15th) our General Conference will be meeting in Minneapolis. The question of human sexuality and the potential for schism will be seriously considered. Pray for this body. Pray for the delegates. Nothing is official unless they vote it into action. My opinions, your opinions, and your cousins' opinions do not have any sway in any decision for our denomination. Indeed, only the General Conference has the say so to change doctrine, maintain doctrine, or amend doctrine. All the work of the General Conference is done prayerfully under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, in the light of the witness of Scripture, and through the holy fellowship of the gathered body of delegates. So, if you are feeling anxious, pray for the General Conference and its delegates. And finally, realize that nothing will be official until after May, no matter what rumors you hear circulating. God be with the people called Methodist
